Cost Structure

- **Grant Stipend for RDHAPs** Funding to compensate dental hygienists for screening services.
- **Grant Funding for Supplies & Marketing** Cover costs for screening materials, educational resources, and outreach.
- Administrative & Care Coordination Costs Support for tracking data and managing referrals.

Sustainability Strategies



How can we create long-term sustainable change?

- Institutionalization Within Schools
 - Advocate for KOHA to be integrated into school health policies, ensuring ongoing commitment.
- Long-Term Funding Strategies:
 - Secure multi-year grants from private foundations or local government health funds.
- Explore Medicaid reimbursement options for screenings and follow-ups.
 - Partner with local businesses and health organizations for sponsorships.
- Building Local Capacity:
 - Train school nurses and staff to conduct basic screenings and reinforce oral health education.
- Volunteer Programs:
 - Establish a volunteer program with local dental students or retired dental professionals.
- Leveraging Existing Resources:
 - Integrate KOHA within broader child health initiatives like immunization clinics or school wellness programs.
- Medical Provider Collaboration:
 - Collaborate with pediatricians to include oral health screenings in routine well-child visits.
- Community Engagement & Advocacy:
 - Work with parent organizations to champion oral health as a key issue.
- Policy Changes:
 - Engage policymakers to recognize KOHA as an essential public health service.
