TRINITY COUNTY KINDERGARTEN ORAL HEATH ASSESSMENT (KOHA)

What is KOHA?

To make sure your child is ready for school, California law requires that children have a dental assessment by May 31 in either kindergarten or first grade, whichever is their first year in public school.

Why is it important?

Poor oral health can affect a child's attendance, grades and overall performance in school. The KOHA helps ensure children are healthy and ready for a successful school year.

11% of children screened needed urgent care



4.41% of children that needed urgent care received treatment

Let's Talk About the Facts:

- Trinity County is recognized as a Health Professional Shortage Area, and this includes Dental Professionals.
- Over 60% of the 0-18 population are Medi-Cal Beneficiaries, and of that group of children only.
- In 2021, only 30% of Medi-Cal Beneficiary, children 0-18 had attended an annual dental visit.
